# **Understanding the Disciplinary Yellow Warning Cards**

### What are Yellow Warning Cards?

Yellow Warning Cards are national and international warnings that are handed out to athletes for certain offences, mainly for animal welfare or incorrect behaviour.

### Who has the authority to award a Yellow Warning Card?

EA accredited officials in official capacity at EA sanctioned events1:

- EA Level 2 Judges
- EA Level 3 Judges
- All FEI Judges
- FEI Chief Stewards
- EA Technical Delegates

### When can a Yellow Warning Card be awarded?

A Yellow Warning Card can be awarded in cases of offences of abuse of horse and/or incorrect behaviour towards event officials (See EA General Regulations Art 169 Paragraph 6.2 and 6.3) and "which are of a less serious nature"<sup>2</sup>.

The Equestrian Australian National Jumping Rules sets out examples of potential breaches at Article 240.2. These summarily include, **but are not limited to**:

- An Athlete that does not leave the arena promptly after being eliminated;
- An Athlete that has been eliminated but completes the round without permission form the Ground Jury;
- Failure to display the identification number in case of repeated offence;
- An Athlete who violates the advertising rules;
- An Athlete who disrespects the directives of the OC;
- An Athlete who repeats offences after a warning.

A more extensive example list can be found at Article 240.2 of the Equestrian Australia National Jumping Rules.

#### If I have awarded a Yellow Warning Card, do I need to notify anyone?

Yes – The Athlete, The Ground Jury, The State Branch and/or the State Jumping Committee who will advise the National Office<sup>3</sup>.

### How do I go about awarding a Yellow Warning Card to an Athlete?

If you as an appropriate EA Official award a Yellow Warning Card, it should be delivered to the Athlete in person at the event with an explanation as to why it was issued and any possible consequences of further offences<sup>4</sup>.

If for any reason that is not possible, then it must be provided to the athlete within fourteen days by mail, email or other means<sup>5</sup>.

### What if the Athlete is under 18 years of age?

To award a Yellow Warning Card to an athlete 18 years or younger a Parent/Guardian must be present at the time. It must be done by personal delivery and the State Branch or State Jumping Committee must be notified of the issuing and reason within 48 hours of the event.<sup>6</sup>

### Can a Yellow Warning Card be issued to an athlete on another sanction?

Yes – if those sanctions are in accordance with the Equestrian Australia General Regulations or relevant Sport Rules<sup>7</sup>.
